



PARENTING TIPS

POTTY TIME!

When and how to help a child learn to use the potty depends on how



ready the child is, as well as each family's own beliefs and values about toilet training.

Most children develop control over their bowel and bladder by 18 months. This skill is necessary for children to physically be able to use the toilet. How ready a child is emotionally to begin learning to use the potty depends on the individual child. Some children are ready at 18 months, and others are ready at 3. While every child is different, about 22% of children are out of diapers by $2\frac{1}{2}$, and 88% of children are out of diapers by $3\frac{1}{2}$.


A child is ready to learn to use the toilet when they:

- Stay dry for at least 2 hours at a time, or after naps
- Recognize they are urinating or having a bowel movement. For example, a child might go into another room or under the table when they have a bowel movement. This is important—if the child does not realize they are having a bowel movement, she won't be successful at potty training.
- Develop physical skills that are critical to potty training—the ability to walk, to pull pants up and down, and to get onto/off the potty (with some help).
- Copy a caregiver's toileting behavior.
- Can follow simple instructions.

Wants to use the potty. They may tell you they to wear "big boy" underpants or learn to go potty "like Daddy does." They may feel uncomfortable in a soiled diaper and ask to be changed or ask to use the toilet themselves. The "what's in for me?" society can be reshaped by modeling service and love for others.
